Education's Heart of Gold

Why devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is in the DNA of the Salesian Congregation
THE MESSAGE OF THE RECTOR MAJOR DON ÁNGEL FERNÁNDEZ ARTIME, SDB

This June, I wish to present to you the reality of the meaning of the Basilica of the Sacred Heart in Rome (Sacro Cuore). It is a church with a very great history—one that has its roots in Don Bosco himself—for at the Pope's request he spent the last years of his life, as well as his last energies and strength, on the construction of this beloved church.

The Sacred Heart, and every church and devotion in honor of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, speaks of the Love of that Divine Heart, the Heart of the Son of God, for each one of His sons and daughters in the entire human race. It also speaks of suffering and of the Love we receive from God, which is not always reciprocated.

Today I wish to add one more aspect: I think it also speaks of the pain that Jesus our Lord feels in the face of the suffering of many people: rejection, immigration without a place to go, loneliness, and the violence done to many. I think it can be said that He speaks of all this, too, and without a doubt at the same time blesses everything that is done on behalf of those less fortunate, just as Jesus Himself did when traveling the roads of Judea and Galilee.

Very many silver hearts

One joyful reality that undoubtedly makes the very Heart of God rejoice is what I myself saw being carried out in the Don Bosco Salesian Foundation on the islands of Tenerife and Grand Canary. I was there in these past weeks. Among the many things experienced, I was able to witness the work of 140 educators who carry forward the various projects of the Foundation, including the reception of those in need and their housing, work training, and subsequent placement in the working world.

I also had an encounter with another group of a hundred adolescents and young adults who have been blessed to have received this service that Don Bosco gives to the least. At the end of our precious meeting, they gave me a gift. In a small, heart-shaped cardboard box, they had placed more than a hundred hearts, bearing the names of Nain, Rocío, Armiche, Mustapha, Xousef, Ainoha, Desirée, Abdjalil, Beatriz and Ibrahim, Yone, and Mohamed, and a hundred

others, each with a message written on it. These messages expressed something simple, and in a simple way, but still, something which sprang from the heart. These are some examples of precious statements:

- Thank you for making all this possible;
- Thank you for the second chance you have given me in my
- I'm still fighting. It's easier to do so with your help;
- Thank you because you have restored my joy;
- Thank you for helping me believe that I can do everything I set out to do:
- Thank you for the food and a home:
- Thank you from the bottom of my heart;
- Thank you for having helped me;
- Thank you for this opportunity to grow; and
- Thank you for believing in us young people despite the situation in which we live.

There were a hundred others, just like these, addressed to Don Bosco and to the educators who are at their side every day in Don Bosco's name.

I listened to all they shared with me. I heard some of their stories—many of them filled with pain. I saw the look in their eyes and their smiles. I was very proud to be a Salesian and to belong to a family of such splendid brothers, educators, and young people.

I thought, yet again, that Don Bosco is as timely as ever—and more necessary than ever. I also thought how great is the educational delicacy with which we accompany these young people along their path, taking each one where he or she is and not where we would like them to be.

Together we said a prayer addressed to the God who loves us all, to the God who blesses His sons and daughters, using words that made Christians, Muslims, and Hindus feel comfortable. No doubt, the Spirit of God assisted us all.

I was happy because just as Don Bosco himself welcomed his first boys to Valdocco, the same thing is experienced today in so many "Valdoccos" around the world.

I have no doubt that the Sacred Heart of Jesus is full of the Love that manifests itself in the many wounds healed in each one of these boys and girls because, we well know, Love heals and cures.

Salesian Pioneers of North America

Fr. Emmanuel Manassero, SDB

Fr. Emmanuel Manassero played important parts in the history of the Salesian Society on three continents.

Emmanuel was born on September 5, 1873, at Bene Vagienna in the province of Cuneo, Italy. He went to the Oratory in Turin as a student in 1885 and had the joy of going to confession to Don Bosco. He became a novice in 1888 and professed at Turin on October II, 1889. At the motherhouse, he received a solid Salesian formation.

At the Gregorian in Rome, he earned degrees in philosophy, canon law, and theology between 1892 and 1896. One year after his ordination in the Lateran basilica at Rome on April 4, 1896, he was appointed director and master of novices at the formation house at Foglizzo (1897-1899). Then he was sent to Oswiecim, the foundational Salesian work in Poland (1898), for six years as director. His success was such that when the Austrian Province was created, encompassing Austria, Poland, and Slovenia (all parts of the Austro-Hungarian Empire), he was nominated provincial. He filled that office from 1905 to 1911.

A term as provincial in Piedmont followed (1911-1917). The scarcity of personnel for the Italian houses during World War I (see Fr. Giraudo's biography of Fr. Albera, ch. 8) necessitated his also serving as director and pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church in Turin; the work also included a school and oratory (one that Don Bosco had founded).

In August 1919, he was appointed the fourth provincial of the United States, where the province of St. Philip covered the whole country. He arrived in New York on October 9. During his eight years as provincial, Salesian High School was opened (1920) on the property recently purchased in New Rochelle and the new Sts. Peter and Paul Church was built in San Francisco from 1922 to 1924. The work in Philadelphia was closed, but another was opened at Watsonville. Parishes were accepted in Elizabeth, NJ (St. Anthony), Los Angeles (Mary Help of Christians), Albany (St. John), Toronto (St. Agnes), and Tampa (St. Joseph and Our Lady of Mercy). In Goshen, St. Michael's School was opened, and in Tampa, Mary Help of Christians Orphanage. Finally, the San Francisco Province of St. Andrew was created on May 28, 1926.

Our archives have 10 letters from Fr. Manassero to Fr. Paul Albera from his arrival in the U.S. in 1919 until Fr. Albera's death in 1921; there are only 2 letters from Albera to him. Most of these have yet to be translated from Italian. But they show Fr. Manassero's solicitude for the confreres and the works. There are dozens more letters between him and major superiors like Frs. Rinaldi and Ricaldone, and to or from U.S. confreres, almost all in Italian. They would, of course, provide deep insight into his labors in the U.S.

At the end of his service in the U.S., Fr. Manassero was sent

to Australia as "visitor," to assess the Salesian work there, which Bishop Coppo had begun in 1922 in the mission territory of Kimberly. Although a fragmentary outpost was added near Melbourne, the work in both places had stagnated. Fr.

Manassero took hold of the situation, withdrawing men from Kimberly and the outpost and purchasing an estate called Rupertswood at Sunbury that could be developed into a school. Bishop Coppo returned to Italy. Fr. Manassero arranged for English-speaking personnel, stabilized finances, and laid a sound foundation for the future Australian Province. He served as director at Sunbury for two years (1927-1929).



Fr. Manassero returned to Italy in 1929. From his residence at Sacred Heart, he dedicated himself to the formation of Salesian clerical students at Rome, offering them his wealth of knowledge, experience, and Salesian virtue. He also carried out an extraordinary visitation in Sicily. He died in Rome on May 29, 1946.

Parenting the "Don Bosco Way" Part III

The complete article was originally printed in The Examiner of Mumbai in January 2004. With Fr. Peter's permission, we will reprint it here in Salesian Family Snippets one section at a time over the coming months as a means of preparation for our Salesian Family Festival 2023. Please see the April 2023 issue of Salesian Family Snippets for a brief curriculum vitae of Fr. Peter Gonsalves, SDB, and Part I of this article. This article is also available in Spanish. Subsequent sections can be found in the successive issues.

N.B. - Fr. Peter has assigned new terms to the traditional ones of the "Preventive System of St. John Bosco." The term "Rapport" replaces that of "Loving-Kindness" in the familiar trinomial of: "Reason, Religion, and Loving-Kindness." "Rapport" is the "third 'R'" of Fr. Peter's trinomial. Further, he gives new nomenclature to our familiar "Preventive System," calling it, instead, the "Expressive System of St. John Bosco." Last, he denotes "Salesian Assistance" as "Presence."

Religion

Today it is so easy to be swayed by mass media presentations of happiness. Wealth, influence, fame, and

appearances—these are popular criteria for success. Parents are influenced by these superficial interpretations of life and they often induce their children to join the frantic chase for the pot of gold and glamour.

Don Bosco, instead, points to the root cause of genuine happiness: an ardent following of the will of God as we daily live our lives in faith and according to a moral plan. Love of God and love of neighbor begin in the home at family prayer. One of the peak moments of family togetherness is the time each family sets aside to worship, praise, thank, and petition God. Only in this manner will parents be able to foster in their children a relationship that goes beyond "feeling good" in each other's company to "being-fully-in-communion" with each other and the surrounding world. Indeed, Don Bosco's is an educative system that is deeply centered around family togetherness—one that is tested on its knees. But one may object. Isn't human rapport sufficient? Why talk of religion with my children when today, more than ever before religion is being seen as a means to divide humanity? Is not an education to a deep love for humanity enough?

The objection is valid, considering the way all religions have had their share of fanatics and fundamentalists who are ready to kill in God's name. The fear of religion turning into an instrument of hate is indeed a real possibility if it ignores reason—which is why Don Bosco gave equal importance to the use of "reason" alongside "religion," a point we will discuss in the fourth section of this article.

True religion, the type understood by Don Bosco, is one that brings out the best in our human nature in order to direct it to a more perfect loving, and a more generous way of living.

Applying this principle to family life, parents would have to confront some fundamental questions: What is the guarantee that the love parents have for their children is not actually a camouflage for some pet affection that is profoundly tainted by their self-interest? Many parents think they want the best for their children but end up forcing them to be dream copies of some unfulfilled personal fancy. Or, how sure can parents be that their child—the joy of their conjugal bliss and fruit of years of sacrifice—will not someday, by some terrible turn of events, become for them 'the curse of their aged lives?' God

alone knows! And, yes, God does know. That is why for Don Bosco, education cannot be reduced to a purely secular humanitarian pedagogy. It has to go much deeper. For him, true education is a spirituality that seeks to inculcate in the heart and the mind of the child a profound sense of confidence in God's unconditional love for humanity. True education opens children to an appreciation for life, to a sense of duty, and to the challenge of generous service.

Life

Parents are to make efforts at being life-enhancing, never life-negating. Young people tend to live life as a feast. Music, theatre, dance, games, sport, art, and crafts—these are all ways of living life's celebration and they have an important place in a child's life. But, equally important are life-enriching attitudes such as gratitude, praise, joy, optimism, mutual encouragement, reverence for creation, interpersonal respect, and sensitivity to peace, tolerance, and justice. In the process of learning and growth, ideas, talents, and energies are all important. Nothing is wasted, no person is taken for granted. Each one respects the other and earns the respect of the other. Ways to overcome difficulties and challenges are sought through trust, participation, and forgiveness in a spirit of family togetherness.
